Winter Cold and Flu Season

In the same way, you should refrain from offering your hand to others at the sign of peace. A smile and a heartfelt "Peace be with you" should suffice. Likewise if you are not comfortable sharing the sign of peace or receiving Holy Communion from the communal chalice for fear of infection, you should feel no pressure to do so. All of us must be aware of such sensitive matters in the intimate life of the Christian community and we should expect that some will refrain from the sign of peace and the communal chalice out of care for our well-being and not out of unkindness or a lack of piety.

What's Going On Outside?

You may have noticed the closure of the Makai entrance and the construction taking place on the south side of the church. The Cathedral is updating their electrical system and will consolidate electrical service at the rear of the church. Workers are trenching along the Makai side to run electrical conduit (and other utilities) in order to eliminate the electrical panels at the front of the building.

The coconut trees, which were near the end of their life, were removed to make room for the trench and for the planned landscape design.

During this process, the Makai entrance will remain blocked to prevent parishioners and visitors from injury caused by the construction. We apologize for any inconvenience and ask for your patience during this time. Mahalo!

February 18, 2018 – First Sunday of Lent Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

Genesis 9:8-15 | Psalm 25:4-5, 6-7, 8-9 | 1 Peter 3:18-22 | Mark 1:12-15

Everything is brought together in Christ: the wild animals of the First Reading join the angels of 1 Peter to minister to Jesus in the desert. All the created order recognizes the Lordship of Christ, but only we humans can choose whether or not to embrace the message Jesus came to proclaim: Now is the time! The kingdom is here! Repent, and believe! That simple message unites all that went before him with what will follow in the ministry of Jesus. God created a good world, but creation rebelled and chose to go its own way. God chastised us and promised redemption, prefiguring it in the waters of the flood. Those floodwaters foreshadow the waters of Baptism through which darkness turns to light and creation is restored to its original goodness.

God placed a rainbow in the sky to remind him of the "covenant I have made between me and you." God willingly bound himself to us and gave a visible sign of accountability regarding the promise to never again destroy the earth with floodwaters. For millennia that promise was sustained in the hearts of a small and feeble people called the Israelites. And in the fullness of time God sent the promise in the form of his Son, so that beasts and angels could recognize him and humans could become like him by enduring the waters of Baptism.

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Cathedral family:

As we begin Lent, we pray in a special way for those to be baptized at Easter, those who will be received into the Catholic Church, and those who will be renewing their relationship with God and the Church by receiving Confirmation and Eucharist. Historically, Lent began as a special time of final preparation for those to be baptized. Today, it also is an opportunity for all of us to renew the grace of our baptism.

Baptism gives us the grace of spiritual adoption as a child of God who loves us. God promises to never abandon us and Genesis reminds us of this promise; the rainbow is a sign of that commitment. Here in Hawaii we are blessed with an abundance of rainbows. In this image of God's love, we are provided with a profound lesson about how God's grace works and is experienced. The rainbow is a product of the sun being reflected through the rain. We are reminded that God's love is experienced most deeply when we allow the Son of God, Jesus Christ, to shine through the "rain" and pain in our lives.

Before Jesus began his public ministry, he went into the desert. He embraced a time of pain and testing and emerged ready to proclaim the gospel of God. During Lent we are invited to put our faith to the test. This might mean coming to weekday mass or Stations of the Cross. We might give more generously of our time and resources to those in need, or deny ourselves little pleasures. By prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, we are challenged to accept the pain involved in renewing our relationship with God and others. This is so that we may be more ready to proclaim with our lives the gospel of God; the good news of God's love for us.

Pope Francis recently streamlined the process to petition for a declaration of nullity to make the process shorter. He also eliminated the mandatory fee. If a person is able to prove in the process that their prior marital bond was invalid for some reason, the he or she can marry in the Catholic Church or validate a current civil marriage.
