Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

Job 38:1, 8-11 | Psalm 107:23-24, 25-26, 28-29, 30-31 | 2 Corinthians 5:14-17 | Luke 7:16 | Mark 4:35-41

Fear can be a debilitating emotion. In today's reading from the Gospel, we see how Jesus can calm storms such as those caused by fear.

Take the example of a mother whose fear of summer thunderstorms left her shaking and scared. She did not want to transfer this fear to her children, yet she could not overcome it in thirty-odd years. So what would she do? Pray. Have faith. Trust that the calm would come. This woman, today a grandmother, never let on to her little ones that she was deathly afraid of thunderstorms. In a very quiet and personal way, she battled a gripping fear without burdening her family. It was not until her children were adults that she thanked them for providing the strength she needed to make it through those summer storms. The calm she received through Jesus is the calm she passed on to her children.

Throughout life we experience many terrifying situations. A minor fear to one person's mind may be very frightening event for someone else. There is, however, no fear so great that God cannot calm it. He can carry us through the storm.
