June 25, 2017 – Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

Jeremiah 20:10-13 | Psalm 69:8-10, 14, 17, 33-35 | Romans 5:12-15 | Matthew 10:26-33

Security is comforting. We like to know our friends are there when we need them. We are at ease knowing there is food in the cupboard or money in our bank account. Our ultimate security, however, is knowing that God's love is ever present for us.

Matthew tells us that after Jesus called forth his disciples, he addressed what was no doubt their primary concern—fear. For the early church of Matthew's time, fear was also a primary concern. They faced daily pressure, even persecution, from the larger society because of their faith.

Through the words of Jesus, Matthew reassures his struggling and anxious church. Two of his points stand out as we reflect on our theme for today. The first we find in the verses right before this reading. Those of us who follow Jesus should expect resistance from worldly powers. The second is the primary focus of our reading. When we follow Jesus, we need not fear earthly powers. The same God who knows the number of hairs on our heads will nurture and protect us. No matter what, we will be safe in God.

As we approach the first days of summer, when the sun shines the longest of any day of the year. Perhaps it is a good time to allow the light of God's truth to heal the painful fears that keep our faith hidden in silence. As followers of Jesus, we can be secure in the knowledge that God watches over us and will someday welcome us into the kingdom of heaven with open arms.

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Cathedral family:

Fear is a very real and understandable human emotion. It a natural reaction to experience fear when we feel that we are threatened or in danger. So, when driving too fast or when standing unprotected on the edge of the roof of a tall building, we should experience fear. It is a self-protective reaction that is very helpful. When Jesus says "Fear no one" and "Do not be afraid" he is not speaking against these natural reactions to potential danger.

The admonition that Jesus gives in the Gospel, "do not be afraid" calls us to let go of the unhealthy fear that can afflict our lives. The problem is not having fear, it is when fear has us. It is the prevailing state of being afraid or living in fear that Jesus wants to free us from. When we are afraid to "speak in the light" and when we fear that we are worthless, we are enslaved by the fear that can disable us.

When we listen to the voices that attempt to terrorize us into hiding our faith and beliefs, we are allowing fear to take hold and prevent us from being all that God has called us to be.

The scriptures today remind us that God is our champion who has won the victory over fear and death and will be with us to help us to be victorious as well. The grace of God overflows with blessings for us and enables us to have courage. Let us face our fears with faith.
