September 25, 2016 – Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

Amos 6:1a, 4-7 | Psalm 146:7, 8-9, 9-10 | 1 Timothy 6:11-16 | Luke 16:19-31

Paul's opening exhortation to Timothy to pursue righteousness is a rallying cry for the message of today's scriptures. Righteousness for Paul means to be in right relationship with God, and by that bond, to be in right relationships with all of God's children, our sisters and brothers. This is the way we must live in order to bring about the reign of God Christ proclaimed.

Those relationships can be righted and reconciled when we care for the very ones whom God loves. The psalm is filled with the images of God's beloved: the oppressed, the hungry, captives, blind people, those bowed down, the just, strangers, the fatherless, widows. Amos uses the image of the rich ignoring the plight and collapse of Joseph in the face of opulence. Luke tells the story of the anonymous rich man dressed in purple who ignored Lazarus begging at his door. If we want to be in relationship with God, we must find ways to cross the wide chasms of complacency dividing us from our brothers and sisters and right all relationships of injustice.

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Cathedral Family:

In today's gospel, Jesus addresses the Pharisees who should have felt convicted and challenged by the parable he told about the rich man and the poor man, Lazarus. Although we may not live in the wanton luxury that Jesus describes, we should feel conviction and challenge as we listen to God's word today. The message is clear.

First of all, salvation is a gift from God. But whether we choose to receive this gift or not in this life has eternal consequences in the next. Lazarus was not in a position to do any of the good deeds or even prayers that we often associate with "earning" our way to heaven. He received this gift freely from God who loved him as much as God loved the rich man. It was not that God did not love the rich man. It was that the rich man rejected that gift of love. He thought that he only needed the goods he acquired for himself during his earthly life. And he acquired a lot! He chose an eternity in hell because he thought that the only heaven he needed was here on earth.

Secondly, sins of omission and neglect are as significant as sins of overt evil. It wasn't that the rich man actively sought to harm Lazarus or sent him away from the proximity of his table of bounty. He either did not notice Lazarus, or if he did, he failed to respond with any compassion. We often think that we are avoiding evil if we just do no harm. But, what are we doing that is good? If we are not helping to alleviate the problems of the world, including those which touch people we know personally, we are contributing to those problems.

Finally, we do not need to ask God to give us further signs in order for us to believe and change our lives. We sometimes think that the problem is always outside of ourselves. If only our circumstances or others would change, then I would be a better person and more loving and spiritual. If only God would do something dramatic, then I would really believe. God has already performed the greatest act of love and power in the dying and the rising of Jesus Christ. God has already given us many reminders of love and power in the people and situations of our lives. What and who are we failing to see?
