October 13, 2019 – 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

2 Kings 5:14-17 | Psalm 98:1, 2-3, 3-4 | 2 Timothy 2:8-13 | Luke 17:11-19

After Naaman, a foreign army leader, is healed by the God of Israel he is convinced this is the true God. He could not remain in Israel he took some soil to maintain the contact with the God of Israel. Naaman's experience reinforces Israel's conviction that their God's power extends to the ends of the earth. The psalm affirms what we have heard in the story of Elisha and Naaman and calls us to remember that although God first chose the people of Israel, his saving power is to be revealed and proclaimed to all peoples and nations.

In the Gospel, the leper from Samaria, realizing he is healed, returns to Jesus. Jews considered Samaritans outcasts and enemies, but narrow boundaries for God's saving action do not exist for Jesus. Time and again he ignored expected behavior to bring God's love to all who were oppressed or considered beyond the fold of God's love. The Samaritan recognizes God at work in Jesus and glorifies his saving action. God's salvation is once again proclaimed to all people.

From the Desk of Fr. Pascual

Dear Cathedral Ohana,

Greetings of peace, love, and joy!

"Where are the other nine?"

The question of Jesus to the cured Samaritan is so striking for us to ponder on. Ten were inflicted with the disease and cried aloud to Jesus so that he can hear them. "Jesus, Master! Have pity on us!" At the command of Jesus for the ten to show themselves to the priests, they went off. As they were heading to where Jesus told them to go, the miracle happened. One of them, realizing he was cured, went back to Jesus. Only one of the ten who were cured thanked him and in humility, fell at Jesus' feet.

The Samaritan showed a gesture that makes us reflect on our Christian life and faith. Recognizing how gracious God is to us, how many times have we showed our gratitude to such goodness and love? In what way or ways have we expressed our appreciation of such gratuity? Don't we sometimes forgo the act of gratitude and contend to ourselves that we are worthy of such goodness?

Our call to be Disciples of Christ today stir our minds and hearts to recognize the goodness of God. In response, sharing our Time, Talent, and Treasure is our concrete way to express our gratitude to Him. It is not repayment of His goodness, for no one can ever repay God's graciousness. But it is our response to His unconditional love and grace as we can sacrifice our Time, Talent, and Treasure to better our families, our church and, to our poor and needy brothers and sisters around us.

When we are grateful to God, we express not only thankfulness but deep faith, trust, love, and hope. It also creates within the awareness that we are in the presence of God and one another. The more we recognize such goodness, the more we connect deeply with our Lord. Since the beginning of time, God has always been good to us. He sent His Son to redeem us. Such love, He has shown us is enough to thank Him. We don't only thank Him when favors are granted but also to thank Him for everything. We hope that when the time of the Lord comes again, we will be the one to be asked by Him, where are the others?
