Living the Liturgy

- Select the beatitude that addresses your greatest weakness — showing mercy, making peace, humility, enduring injustice — and ask at least two people to pray with you as you make a special effort to embrace the challenge of that beatitude.
- The first letter of John says the world “did not know him” (3:1). Decide to make God better known by speaking of God’s influence in your life at least once a day.
- Make a space in your home to spend time with the saints. Include books or videos about your family’s patron saints to share this month. Also include holy cards from funerals of loved ones, photographs, or other mementoes of family members who have gone before you. Read the beatitudes often this month and think of your deceased loved ones who exemplified them.

Sharing the Faith

- Do you ever wonder about life in heaven and “what we shall be” (1 John 3:2)? Do those you are closest to share your convictions about life after death? Do you worry about it?
- How do you feel about the image of Christ as a lamb? Does it seem fitting, or beneath his exalted position? What attitudes or commitment does that image call you to?
- Which of the beatitudes presents the greatest challenge for you? Why do you think this is so difficult for you? What steps can you take to begin embracing this virtue?

Nov. 1, 2020 – Solemnity of All Saints

Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

Revelation 7:2-4, 9-14 | Psalm 24:1bc-2, 3-4ab, 5-6 | 1 John 3:1-3 | Matthew 5:1-12a

John's grand vision of the heavenly liturgy encompasses a countless multitude who wear the white robes of sanctity. When the elder asks John who these people in white are, John demurs and lets the elder answer the question. The elder doesn't identify them by their achievements, for they stand before God's throne because of what Christ did for them. They have not whitened their robes with any bleaching agent of their own making but with the blood of the Lamb, the blood Christ shed and offers freely to all. They understand that better than anyone and that's why they declare boldly that salvation comes from the Lamb — a gift received, not earned.

There is no laundry room where we can soak our robes in Christ's blood. That happens only as we walk with him and live the beatitudes. But it won't just be our robes that change. If we observe the beatitudes, we will end up looking like Christ. The Letter of John promises this. Little by little, we will be transformed by God's Word when we let it penetrate our hearts. As we put it into action — hungering for righteousness, showing mercy, making peace, enduring persecution — we will become more like God and his divine Son. God's grace will move within us and we will look like him and we will "be like him" (1 John 3:2). In short, we will be saints.

From the Desk of Fr. Pascual

Dear Cathedral Basilica Ohana,

Greetings of peace, love, and joy!

"Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven!" (Mt. 5: 12)

I always remember that every time I fulfilled any tasks that my grandmother would ask me to do, I get rewarded. A peso, for that matter, as a kid, was a big deal for me. With it, I can buy the soda I like or the biscuit I wanted to eat. It felt good to be rewarded, but I would say it even felt better to accomplish something that my grandmother recognized.

In life, we all go through doing things to be rewarded. It is an accomplished goal, getting good grades, good paying jobs, and even being recognized with a plaque of appreciation. After a good series in sports, teams get rewarded with high trophies and even recognized, nationally, and internationally. All these rewards are brought about by the work done, efforts exhausted, and sacrifices made. There is so much joy in doing good and, at the same time, being rewarded for the good things done.

From the beginning of our lives, there has already been good embedded in our whole being in life and faith. We are all created according to the image and likeness of God. And by our baptism, we are sons and daughters of the Father. We do not need to do good to be good. This identity alone can already be our source of joy and goodness. But in reality, in one way or the other, we strayed from this path of goodness. Because of our human weakness, we sinned and have fallen astray. But the goodness of the Lord is always there for us, calling us back to His love and grace. As such, our efforts to change our lives are vital that will make us once again made whole and holy.

The celebration of the Solemnity of All Saints enables us to reflect on the life God has given us. All Saints and All Souls Day are days to remind us of the fragility of life. It calls us to envision that our best reward in life is no other than being with God, who gave us life and the source of everything we have. Pope Francis said, *"the Solemnity of All Saints is "our" celebration: not because we are good, but because the sanctity of God has touched our life. The Saints are not perfect models, but people through whom God has passed. We can compare them to the Church windows, which allow light to enter different shades of color. The saints are our brothers and sisters who have welcomed the light of God in their hearts and have passed it on to the world, each according to his or her own "hue." But they were all transparent; they fought to remove the stains and the darkness of sin to enable the gentle light of God to pass through. This is life's purpose: to enable God's light to pass through; it is the purpose of our life too."*

In our journey into this world, we aim to be with God and all those we love. We need to keep doing good like the saints did and wait for the day that we hear the words of Jesus, "Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven."
