November 11, 2018 – 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Exegesis on this Sunday's readings

1 Kings 17:10-16 | Psalm 146:7, 8-9, 9-10 | Hebrews 9:24-28 | Mark 12:38-44 or 12:41-44

Read the Bible and you will run into the admonition, "Do not be afraid." It recurs many times, and some researchers insist that in various permutations you can find it close to 365 times — once for each day of the year! It was often on the lips of Jesus and seems to be the key to embracing the radical discipleship he requires. Of what are we to not be afraid? Not hardship, not persecution, not hunger, not danger, not even death, nor anything else you can think of. Fear cripples. It makes it hard, sometimes impossible, to take a risk, and the Christian life is all about risk. Jesus' words are not always soothing. They require a radical trust that is impossible if we are filled with fear.

Elijah makes an unreasonable demand of the poor widow. First make me a cake, he says, and then "prepare something for yourself and your son" (1 Kings 17:13). What reasonable mother would put a stranger's needs ahead of her own son's? Certainly not one who is riddled with fear. Fear would make Elijah's promise that her jar will not go empty and her oil not run dry sound like gibberish. Fear would deafen the woman's ears and send her back to her kitchen and her meager ingredients. Only a peaceful heart could trust that promise. To acquire such peace we must enroll in the school of trust and practice daily letting go of fear.

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Cathedral family:

"They gave a substantial gift." Usually, when we hear such a statement, we assume that someone has given a large sum of money or something very valuable in material terms. Today's scriptures invite us to a deeper understanding of the meaning of a "substantial gift". A "substantial gift" is a gift that comes from the very substance of who we are. All three readings speak of such a gift and challenge us to this kind of generosity.

A substantial gift is a gift that is given with faith and trust. We believe that, even though we don't seem to have enough, if we are generous God will provide all that we need. The Book of Kings describes a widow who gave such a gift and was blessed by God because of her generosity.

A substantial gift is a gift that it hurts to give and is therefore sacrificial. The Letter to the Hebrews describes how Christ gave such a gift when he gave himself for our salvation. He was willing to suffer and die for us and, therefore, his gift was powerful enough to take away the sins of many.

A substantial gift is a gift that is not given from our "leftovers", but from the "first fruits" of what we have. The Gospel of Mark describes the poor widow who gave all that she had, and not from any excess that she had. She was not giving in order to get rid of something that she really didn't need, but was offering her best.

Generosity is a virtue that is at the heart of Christianity. It may involve giving material resources or it may require giving our time or talent in particular areas. In any case, we are invited today to consider how we make those gifts. Do we do so with faith and trust? Do we give even when it hurts? Are we only giving God our leftovers? God reminds us that a "substantial gift" doesn't have to involve a lot of money. But it should involve a lot of love!

In today's bulletin you will find a report on our Cathedral finances. We are grateful to all those who give to our Church even when it is challenging. On this Veteran's Day weekend, we are also grateful to those who serve and who have served our country, even to the point of offering the ultimate sacrifice of their lives.
